## Judicial Review

El Segundo Student Court Convened April 17 with Larry Brown presiding. The case pending was El Segundo vs. Jack Wooding. Les Simmons and Hal Bopp handled the prosecution and Kreg Brown with the aid of Mr. Wilson for an associate.

The case involved Mr. Wooding being illegally in the halls at noon. The defense based its case on the theory that Mr. Wooding was in the halls for a purpose and that the officers issuing the invitation had not warned him. The prosecution argued that Mr. Wooding had no purpose for being in the halls and should therefore be found guilty.

The justices retired and brought chief Justice Larry Brown a sentence of four demerits and one hour detention.

Mr. Brown, defense council handled his case well and is considering appealing it on the grounds of prejudice and perjury.

**Two Athletes, C. K. Kang And Gabor Nagy Interviewed In L. A.; Talk About Olympics**

C. K. Yang, decathlon champion from Nationalist China and U.C.L.A. and Gabor Nagy, former Hungarian Olympic swimming and water polo star were interviewed Saturday, April 18 at the Carnation Building in Los Angeles by High School reporters.

C. K. Yang, a U.C.L.A. Graduate is now a Physical Education teacher there. The first Nationalist Chinese to hold two silver medals for the decathlon, Yang hopes to take first

place in the decathlon at the 1964 Olympics in Japan.

C. K. was the first man to score more than 9000 points in a decathlon. Yang feels that he won't break his own record of 9000 points because there will be too much competition.

Yang is going to China after the Olympics, but doubts that he will make his home there. His American wife prefers her own country to Formosa.

Mr. Gabor Nagy, the former Hungarian Olympic swimming and water polo star defected to the U.S. during the Olympic Games of 1956.

Nagy did most of the talking at the interview. The main topic of his discussion was government aid to intramural and Olympic sports. He also expressed his feelings that high schools should make every student participate in a sport, whether it be a major sport like football or basketball, or minor like cycling and hand ball. This would promote physical fitness and prepare American athletes for future Olympics.

Mr. Nagy is now retired from Athletics and is in the Motion Picture Business.
