## SENIORS TAKE-OVER EL SEGUNDO CITY GOVERNMENT LIMBERG & JEFFERIES BECOME LEADERS FOR DAY

Eighteen ESHS seniors were selected to participate in the annual El Segundo Student Government Day yesterday, April 22.

Wayne Limberg served as mayor; Robin Jefferies, city manager; Cheryl Landreth, clerk; Judy Mondy, treasurer; Bob Wood, chief of police; Craig Mousel, chief of fire; Jim Preston, public works; Bill Flayer, director of buildings and safety; Jim Slatton, parks and recreation; Jeff Peterson, city attorney; Carol Cox, superintendent of schools. Serving as city councilmen were Nancy Hereford, Donna Bicksler, Beth Hanson and Frank Chism. Honorary councilmen were Ulla Burchard, Jan Wada and Marlies Strunze.

Participating seniors were chosen by Mr. Maurice Ward, Mr. Roland Maynard and Mr. Wallace Duffy on the basis of scholastic ability, activities and ability to speak in public.

Activities included a luncheon and a mock city council meeting in which all students participated.

The purpose of this activity was "to give seniors a more practical appreciation of the functions and duties of city offices and of the democratic form of government," stated Mr. Maynard.

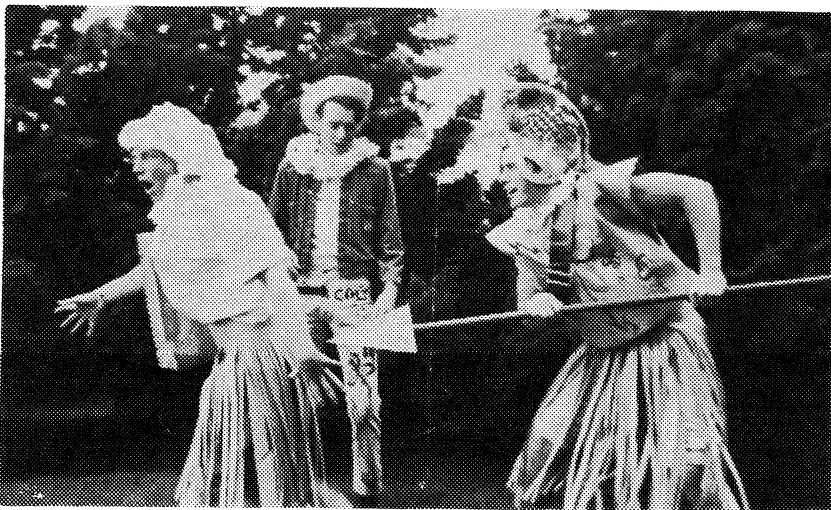
"Congratulations to these honored seniors, and to the many others who will also be honored before the completion of their distinctive high school careers," stated Jim Slatton, senior class president.
