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Senior Attained Semi-Finalist Status

Jack Cuzick, an El Segundo High School senior, has attained semi-finalist status in Southern Division competition for Southern California Edison's college scholarships, G. E. Wilcox, division manager, announced recently.

Jack is a Seal Bearer in the California Scholarship Federation, and is active in such school organizations as Key Club, Math Club, Student Council and was a member of the basketball team.

One scholarship valued at \$4,000 is awarded in each of the electric company's six geographic divisions, he said. This means that one of the students in this division will receive \$1,000 per year for four regular academic years at his choice of participating Southland private colleges and universities. In addition, the college attended by each winner receives a direct grant of \$750 per year for the four academic years.

The scholars named semi-finalists for this division will be interviewed by a panel of leading educators and citizens of this area.

Three will be named winners of "Edison Gold Awards for Scholastic Achievement" and awarded suitably engraved wall plaques. These three will continue into the finals of the Edison competition, and the scholarship winner will be named by another panel of civic and educational leaders following personal interviews in Los Angeles on April 21.

The elite students winning a place in the semi-finals from this division were selected on the basis of their score on the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College of Entrance Examination Board and their scholastic record in high school.

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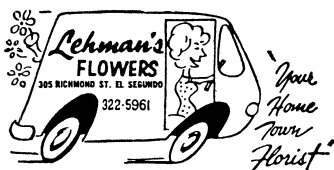
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
